## How will the OCR rise affect home loans?

Just over a week ago, the Reserve Bank increased the Official Cash Rate (OCR) by 0.50% to take it from 4.25% to 4.75%.

Many Kiwis were hoping Governor Orr might go easier this time round, maybe even pause hikes to provide relief to the economy and those most severely impacted after the recent North Island floods and Cyclone Gabrielle. However, supporting New Zealand's recovery is the Government's job, not the RBNZ's, so the increase was not unexpected.

This shift suggests that while the Reserve Bank feels there's still work to be done to get inflation back to acceptable levels, it's seeing strong signs that things are starting to come under control.

By opting for 0.50%, the RBNZ has done the best it can to strike the balance between going too hot (0.75%) – sending us hurtling for a hard landing – or too cold (0.25%) and potentially undoing the progress that's been made to date in the battle against inflation.

In terms of home loan rates, whilst floating rates will increase, a 0.50% OCR increase was already priced into the fixed rates in the market, so the good news is they shouldn't climb any further from here.

For now, it looks like the RBNZ is biding its time before any further OCR increase while it waits to see the full impact of previous hikes.

### War on Weeds postponed

The War on Weeds will be shifted to April this year, instead of the usual March dates, to give the community time to focus on cleanup and recovery efforts from the recent floods and storm.

From 1 to 30 April, extra weed bins will be provided around West Auckland to support locals to dispose of invasive weeds from their own backyards.

"We welcome any opportunity to help west Aucklanders do their bit to help keep invasive weeds out of the native bush we all love," says Mel Ward (below) from EcoMatters' Nature Team, who manages the bins, "but this year, we know many of us have other things on our minds right now."

Making the bins available during April will also help reduce traffic on the roads, so repairs can continue.

Invasive weeds accepted at the bins include climbing asparagus, Japanese honeysuckle, jasmine, moth plant, wild ginger, woolly nightshade and more.

Some weeds are already starting to form seed pods in March, so Mel is encouraging those who can do so, to bag up the seed pods/heads from moth

plants and wild ginger to stop these from spreading.

Most bins will still be in their usual sites in April, but you can double check locations at ecomatters.org.nz/war-on-weeds. Henderson-Massey and Waitākere Ranges local boards are supporting this project.



### We want to hear your views

Auckland Council's planned consultation on this year's budget is a particularly important consultation.

Climate change mitigation and adaption should be Tamaki Makaurau Auckland's top priority but the proposed cuts in the 2023/2024 Annual Budget proposal have the potential to undermine that priority.

If confirmed by Council, the Waitākere Ranges Local Board's budget will be cut \$765,786 – nearly 10% of our budget for community delivery. Local environmental projects, the arts and community support will bear the brunt of these anticipated cuts.

The board is faced with having to severely curtail its weeds and predator control programmes as well as support for community environmental action. The recent flood-related slips clearly show that weed infested slopes are unstable and we urgently need to improve stability. And cuts will mean that we will have to curtail action on climate change at a time

when such action has never been more necessary.

Arts programmes and facilities that contribute greatly to the area will have to be cut. In particular, funding for Te Uru Gallery may be compromised, even though the gallery has transformed Titirangi since its opening and has improved business conditions in the village dramatically.

Community organisations that perform important work very efficiently will be drastically affected.

When the consultation starts it will be important to hear from everyone.

What do you value about the local board's activities and what are the areas where it is absolutely vital to maintain activity at current levels? We look forward to hearing your views.

### Relief for West Aucklanders after the storm



t takes a community to help get a community back onto its feet and, following the recent flooding in West Auckland, Glen Eden-based Visionwest Community Trust joined other community groups to mobilise quickly and play an active part in the relief response.

The strength of Visionwest lies in the experience of its trained staff and its wraparound support services and this is where Visionwest focused its relief efforts.

The immediate response was to provide staff to help at local Civil Defence Hubs and Community Hubs.

The Pātaka Kai and Whānau Centre supplied pallets of food, bedding and

household items to Community Hubs and other organisations. The Community Housing teams took care of

housing issues, both for those who required urgent accommodation and those who required follow-up support.

As community groups move to focus on longer-term support needs, the Money Mentors team is supporting whānau with issues relating to their finances, including help with benefits and insurance claims. Meanwhile, with many people experiencing shock and trauma as a result of their experiences, the Wellbeing Centre and Mātanga Oranga are providing counselling sessions.


