

## Glen Eden's green spaces win international recognition again



NOT ONE BUT TWO local green spaces have again been awarded the prestigious Green Flag award, the international quality mark for parks and green spaces.

Waikumete Cemetery and Parrs Park have both been awarded the prestigious honour, which recognises and rewards parks and green spaces providing high-quality, innovative recreational experiences for our communities.

The award sets a benchmark standard for recreational outdoor spaces worldwide.

Waitākere Ranges Local Board chair Saffron Toms is delighted by the awards: "Once again two of our amazing parks have been awarded these prestigious awards.

"It stands as a testament to the fabulous work done to care for the parks that they continue to receive the awards each year.

in England in 1996 and introduced to Australasia in 2012. It assesses how well green spaces meet the needs of the local community.

Managed locally by Recreation Aotearoa and overseen by Keep Britain Tidy, judging criteria for the awards include quality of services, safety, maintenance, community involvement and sustainability.

The purpose and aims are:

- To ensure that everybody has access to quality green and

other open spaces, regardless of where they live

- To ensure that these spaces are appropriately managed and meet the needs of the communities that they serve
- To establish standards of good management
- To promote and share good practice in the green space sector
- To recognise and reward the hard work of managers, staff and volunteers.

## Waikumete Cemetery

At 108 hectares, Waikumete is NZ's largest cemetery, and the southern hemisphere's largest burial ground for service personnel. Operating since 1876, it is the final resting place for over 70,000 people. Burial options include garden and lawn memorials and natural burials as well as a columbarium and mausolea. Its heritage buildings include The Chapel of Faith in the Oaks built in 1886, often used for weddings. Waikumete has a rich history and includes memorials to Erubus, the Holocaust, the Influenza Epidemic and the ANZAC Cenotaph.

## Parrs Park

Parrs Park is located where Oratia stream becomes two streams, Oratia and Waikumete. Project Twin Streams is a restoration project for local streams begun in 2003. Since 2006, EcoMatters Environment Trust has worked with the Glen Eden community on it. Together with Auckland Council contractors, they tend 15.6 km of the Waikumete Stream catchment, including at Parrs Park. West Auckland's largest Mataawaka marae, Hoana Waititi Marae, is on the park's eastern boundary. It has a kura (school) and is very active locally.

# They helped to get Auckland recognised as an Age-friendly City

TWO Glen Eden residents were central to Auckland gaining acceptance recently into the World Health Organisation's (WHO) Global Network of Age-friendly Cities and Communities (GNAFCC).

Community stalwarts Janet Clews and Gayle Marshall have been co-chairs on the Seniors Advisory Panel – from 2018 and 2020 respectively – which worked on the submission together with Auckland Council staff and other organisations.

"The Seniors Panel are the kaitiaki (guardians) of Age-friendly Auckland," says Gayle, "and working on this has

She says joining the Global Network is an important milestone for Auckland, especially as the city's population ages.

"We know older people experience barriers to participation across all areas of life, and if we want to be a world-class city, we need to commit to better access for everyone.

"The Global Network brings together like-minded cities and communities committed to becoming more age-friendly. It's great to see Auckland recognised in this space and

we're looking forward to sharing ideas with other members."

The WHO Global Age-friendly Cities Guide identifies core characteristics of an age-friendly city in eight areas of urban life:

- Outdoor spaces and buildings
- Transportation
- Housing
- Social participation
- Respect and social inclusion
- Civic participation and employment
- Communication and information
- Community support and health services.

## As property prices soften...



Robyn Rule of Barfoot & Thompson Glen Eden writes on property matters

HOUSE PRICES are edging down in some cases. Most forecasts are saying the downward trend will be somewhere between 5% and 7%.

We’re already seeing that price softness seep though – some properties have been selling for up to 10% less than they would have at the end of last year.

That’s not consistent across the board, though, and the fact that some houses are selling for 10% less definitely doesn’t mean the entire market has dropped by as much.

It’s the old golden rule: properties that are scarce – high quality ones, in areas where there’s still hot demand – are continuing to perform really well.

But with less demand, supply increasing, and tighter and more expensive lending, it’s not good news for properties that are unattractive or not well presented, that don’t have code of compliance, or that leak. Such properties will inevitably take a bit of a hit.

For anyone who’s been sitting in the market for years, with significant capital gains under your belt, the implications should be pretty minimal.

You may feel a little less well-off because that underlying investment has gone backwards slightly in value, but the actual material impact is probably marginal – and the likelihood of ending up with negative equity is pretty much nil.

## Optometrist v Ophthalmologist v Dispensing Optician

Optometrists are the first line of care for your eye health. They perform routine eye exams to diagnose vision problems and eye diseases, and provide solutions to vision problems including prescribing glasses and contact lenses.

Also, they monitor or manage eye disease such as cataracts and know when a person needs to be referred to see an ophthalmologist.

The bachelor of optometry degree is a 5-year course at the University of Auckland. It is the only programme in New Zealand that will enable a graduate to apply for registration to practice as an Optometrist.

Ophthalmologists are medical doctors that specialise in the care of more complex eye disorders and perform eye surgery if required. To

become an ophthalmologist one must work for two years as a house officer (supervised junior doctor) in a hospital, work for another five years as a registrar with specialist training, and pass examinations to become a Fellow of the Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Ophthalmologists.

Dispensing opticians interpret prescriptions from optometrists and ophthalmologists for glasses or contact lenses, assemble and fit glasses, and advise customers on frames and lenses. To qualify as a dispensing optician you need to get a job as a trainee dispensing optician at an optometrist practice and while working there complete the Certificate IV in Optical Dispensing New Zealand through the Australasian College of Optical Dispensing.
